
The Life of Theodor Seuss Geisel

- (1) Most of you have read the children's books *The Cat in the Hat* or *Green Eggs* and *Ham* or *How the Grinch Stole Christmas*. And most of you have heard of the name Dr. Seuss, the author of those books and many others. But was he really a doctor? Actually, no, his real name was Theodor Seuss Geisel. Although he wasn't a real doctor, he did help millions of children learn to read.
- (2) Theo Geisel was born in Springfield, Massachusetts in 1904. Theo's father was in charge of a park near their house. Inside the park was a zoo and a library was right beside the park. Theo spent most of his childhood either playing in the zoo or reading books in the library.

He drew cartoons that made the enemies of the United States look mean and unkind. They were "dark" drawings for a dark time. He wanted the people in the United States to look at his cartoons and support the war. In 1943, Dr. Seuss actually joined the U.S. Army. His role was to write and make movies to promote peace throughout the world.



- (4) In 1954, Dr. Seuss wanted to start writing children's books. In 1954, Life magazine published a report that claimed American schoolchildren were no longer reading. The report stated that children felt that most children's books were boring. This report upset Dr. Seuss. He loved reading as a child and felt that this was a shame. He began writing books that would attract children. He pulled from his childhood imagination of running through his father's zoo. He drew odd, but elaborate pictures. He made up strange characters and told stories through sentences that rhyme. He wanted to make reading fun again.
- (5) Well, it worked. In 1957, the classic book *The Cat in the Hat* was published. It was a huge success, and it still remains the best children's book of all time. Before his death in 1991, Dr. Seuss wrote and illustrated 48 books for children in an effort to get more children to read!
